

Grade 5th 2025 Summer Reading Assignment:

Main Assignment: During the summer, students are expected to read *Tuck Everlasting*. We will discuss the novel the first week of school in September. Each student is to write 3 paragraphs in which he/she presents a summary, discusses the main characters, and opinion of the book *Tuck Everlasting* by Natalie Babbitt.

Suggested Outline: Main Assignment

Paragraph 1: Summary of book. Please be sure to discuss the main parts of the book from beginning to end. (5-8 sentences)

Paragraph 2: Discuss the main characters in the book. Please be sure to discuss the main character's actions, how other characters feel about them, and if they are a villain or hero within the story. (5-8 sentences)

Paragraph 3: After reading *Tuck Everlasting*, write about your opinion of the book. What did you like or not like about the book? Would you change anything about it? (5-8 sentences)

2. Second Assignment:

Then the student may choose another novel from the list below and then write a summary of the novel and be ready to share their thoughts on it. Each assignment needs to be typed.

Suggested Outline for Second Assignment:

Paragraph 1: Discuss what the book was about, write a blurb that would describe perfectly to a reader what topic they are about to read about.

Paragraph 2: Discuss the plot of the book, and how the main character(s) help to solve an issue or problem that is occurring in the book.

Paragraph 3: Discuss the ending of the book, how were any problems or issues resolved?

After you finish *Tuck Everlasting*, please create your own MUSIC BOX as your summer project. Be creative and fun!!
